What is DUAL ENROLLMENT?

Classes taken through a Georgia college or university which result in college AND high school credit for students

FREE to Georgia high school students

DUAL ENROLLMENT FACTS:

11th and 12th graders are eligible

Students must apply and be accepted at the college

Maximum number of credit hours available is 30

"College Credit" may be "required" or "elective"

Students receive extra half point up to a 3.0 for AP and Dual Enrollment courses toward their HOPE GPA



TYPES OF DUAL ENROLLMENT AT THE COLLEGE & CAREER ACADEMY

- Career Classes through GNTC
- Academic Classes through Dalton State and GNTC taught remotely on College & Career Academy campus

APPLICATION PROCESS:

- Meet with your HHS counselor to see if you are eligible based on your GPA, ACT, SAT, etc.
- Apply to the college
- Send transcripts/test scores
- Complete funding application for dual enrollment
- Register for classes
 - Shorter and GNTC register for classes with HHS counselor
 - Dalton State students schedule with the dual enrollment counselor at the college

APPLICATION DEADLINES:

GNTC is May 1st

Shorter University is May 1st

Dalton State is May 15th (late deadline of July 1st but may affect classes availability)

CONSIDERATIONS:

Grades and assignments come from college professors.

 Neither HHS staff nor parents will be regularly informed regarding student performance or attendance.

 Class schedule will match the college schedule for dual enrollment classes.

 Students will need to take the lead in communicating with their professors.

 Students who drop a college class will be assigned to a high school class to give them a full schedule.

CHOOSING CLASSES:

- Students must communicate with HHS counselors to ensure that they are taking classes which satisfy high school graduation requirements!
- College classes may not be offered every semester and may fill up.
- Determine if the college classes you are taking will be counted as "required" or "electives" for your planned college major.

ADVANCED PLACEMENT vs. DUAL ENROLLMENT

• AP is recognized nationwide.

• Students must take and pass AP exam to receive college credit.

• Students must pay for AP exam (some free

test options available).

• HHS students with the highest ACT and SAT scores tend to take the most AP classes.
